CATS December Meeting

The December meeting, as usual, was devoted to the Annual General Meeting. A total of nineteen members turned out on a very blustery evening.

CATS Chairman Glenn G4FVL opened the meeting and gave his view of the Society's past year, including membership and past/proposed activities.

CATS Secretary Steve G3WZK then delivered his report on the Society's year 2011, detailing membership figures, attendances at meetings and events, society activities, contest activities, and the work of the committee in managing the society's affairs. He also reported on the very recent success of CATS member Martin Rothwell – previously 2E0MHS – who has now gained a full licence and the callsign M0SGL.

The current membership is 45 compared with 38 at the end of 2010 and 36 at the end of 2009.

The Treasurer then presented the Society's audited accounts for the year ended 31 October 2011, which showed a healthy surplus.

In the Committee elections, all of the previous incumbents were re-elected to the same roles as before. (Details as on page one of this issue of *CATS Whispers*.)

There was then a break for refreshments – including mince pies and wine - followed by announcement of the Chairman for 2012 (Glenn G4FVL) and Any Other Business.

G3WZK Computer Saga -Part One

Towards the end of November, my desktop PC was struck by something really nasty. I've still no idea where it came from but the trouble it caused was immediately obvious and considerable.

The machine was fine before supper but when I came back after the evening meal there were countless unclearable error messages on the screen, together with a window inviting me to "click here to fix your computer's problems." This was of course suspicious – it was impossible to get rid of this screen and after a forced reboot (depressing the power on/off button or five seconds to reset the power supply) it was clear that the machine was well and truly broken.

I decided to change the boot sequence from BIOS to see if the PC would boot from my Windows XP DVD. However the machine completely refused to read the DVD and kept trying to boot from hard disc. To me, this suggested that there must be some sort of fault with the motherboard so my next priority was to try and save my data. I removed the hard discs and using an EIDE to USB adaptor plugged them into my laptop.

Both discs seemed to contain the right amount of data but curiously, many folders had disappeared together with the files they were meant to contain. Disaster!

Worryingly, the following weekend I was due to instruct on a Foundation Course at Banstead but all my recent work to update my slides had apparently disappeared! Fiddling around, I found that my PowerPoint files were now "hidden," but it was impossible to "unhide" them in the normal manner. Fortunately, on Microsoft's website, I soon found instructions for taking ownership of files and folders on a different machine, so I quickly changed the settings and copied my Foundation files to a memory stick ready for the weekend. Phew! I would be okay on the course and I vowed that the following week I would start designing a new PC and ordering the parts for it. At this stage it is worth pointing out that my "failed" PC was a homebrew machine that first booted up in 2001, so it had given me just over ten years of good service. It had had a few updates along the way, but I had been expecting a failure soon and was planning to build a new one over Christmas 2011. Sadly it had failed a month or so too soon.

In Banstead on the Saturday morning Martin M1MRB had given the opening sessions and it was my turn to talk about EMC. I plugged my memory stick into Martin's laptop and browsed for my slides. They weren't there! The previous version was however still there so I could cope – but you can imagine what an idiot I felt for having copied the wrong version onto the memory stick. Doh !!!

Over a coffee break I explained my predicament to some of the students, one of whom was an IT manager and who suggested that a boot sector virus could be the cause of the problem with my PC. I however was convinced that I had a hardware fault – after all if you set the BIOS to boot up from CD/DVD and the machine doesn't, then surely either the CD/DVD drive (or IDE cable) or other hardware must be faulty.

Back home after the course, I put my memory stick into my own laptop. My missing presentation slides *were* there after all – but greyed out. They were shown as "hidden" on Windows Explorer. What could be going on? They were visible on my laptop but not elsewhere. Very odd!

I then scanned the original hard discs, using the McAfee antivirus software on my laptop and the EIDE to USB adaptor mentioned above. It revealed and deleted several copies of a virus called XCPT-HOOK1. Great, I thought, quickly reinstalling the hard discs back in the original PC case.

With some trepidation I switched on and waited for the machine to reboot. Eventually a very sickly desktop appeared. Most files and folders had disappeared. As Windows XP creates restore points I started to look for Control Panel so that I could restore the machine to a previous good restore point, but Control Panel had disappeared. What could I do next?

Remembering the advice from the weekend I did some research on the Internet and discovered that McAfee have a free

downloadable tool called "Stinger". According to the website, "Stinger is a standalone utility used to to assist administrators and users when dealing with an infected system."

I downloaded Stinger and ran it. It found and removed various nasties such as HRiPwnH2bLXWge.exe, Fake Alert-QU and NgTuiSACmhn.exe. My PC was improved, but still sickly. Worst of all, XCPT-HOOK1 was still there! I unhid a few files and rebooted, only to find that those same files were now hidden all over again! I concluded that the PC must be re-infecting itself every time it was rebooted. Further internet research suggested that the cause of the problem could be a Trojan called TDSS.e!rootkit. It also revealed that Kaspersky have a free downloadable tool called an "Anti-rootkit utility TDSSKiller" specifically aimed at boot sector viruses. With nothing to lose, I downloaded this tool as well and ran it.

To say I was amazed about what happened next is the understatement of the year! It took less than a minute for the Kaspsersky tool to identify the presence of a boot sector virus and offer to rewrite some virus-free standard code in its place. After clicking "yes" the machine rebooted. It was still very sickly, but it was stable. When I unhid a few files as an experiment, the files remained "unhidden" after rebooting. But nearly everything was missing, including Control Panel. A virus free machine – but still a very sick one.

My next task was to try to find a restore point. I managed to "unhide" the file control.exe on which Control Panel depends. A very rudimentary Control Panel appeared but most functions within it, including System Restore, weren't available.

It seemed that I would have to use the Windows repair function from the original DVD – but then a thought struck me. What if other machines in the house had been infected by the virus? So before doing anything else, I scanned every disc on every machine in the house with every ant-virus tool at my disposal. Fortunately, they were all clear.

Then it was time to attempt the Windows repair function. Well, to cut a long story short, it simply didn't work. The vast majority of files, folders and Windows functions, including the Control Panel ones, remained invisible. So much for a "repair". Realising that a full Windows re-install would erase all my data, the next step was to remove the hard discs again and copy onto an external 1TB drive all my data, including, Word, Excel and PowerPoint files, my mail folders and address books and anything else I could find. Not easy when most items were still hidden! The 1TB drive, by the way, is the device I normally used for my data back-ups.

Several hours later, the copying of data was complete. It would then have been safe to reinstall Windows XP from scratch, even though this would have completely wiped the hard discs. However, I decided to leave the machine overnight in case I had any last-minute brainwaves about other items of data that needed to be saved too.

The following morning, I began the rebuild process from my original Windows XP disc. All went well and it booted properly first time and was virus-free. What should I install first – antivirus software perhaps? I logged on to McAfee and attempted to download my software again. "Sorry," it said, "your web browser is Internet Explorer 6 and lacks the ability to download McAfee Security Suite."

"A-ha," I thought, "I'll install a different browser and teach Microsoft a lesson." As I had been using Google Chrome on my laptop for some time, I decided to try that. Unfortunately, the Chrome site said my operating system was too old to run Chrome, instead I needed Windows XP Service pack 3. It suggested that typing "winver" at the Run prompt would tell me which version of XP I had. The answer - Service Pack 1 - meant that I would need to install Service Pack 1a from the Microsoft site first. after which I could then download the subsequent upgrade to Service Pack 3. This was getting complicated but do-able. However the Microsoft Service Pack 1a server was persistently down, and remained down despite repeated attempts to access it, for over a day, so I was stuck yet again.

Then I discovered that the cover of my original XP disc bore a sticky label saying "contains SP1a," so maybe an upgrade straight to SP3 would be possible, after all.

To cut a long story short, the SP3 install worked first time and I had a fully functioning system, albeit with no data and no user software. However, Chrome now installed first time, followed by the McAfee security system. What a palaver!

Then my XYL dropped a bombshell. She said that she needed her website

www.jennybeal.co.uk updated by the following Monday. The race was on to reinstall Microsoft Front Page, (Website editing software) download and install Cute FTP software (for uploading web pages to the Internet), and make the required changes to the website. I am pleased to say that this was achieved late on the Sunday afternoon. Phew!

After that, I was able to get on with other jobs for the rebuild such MS Office and Adobe Photoshop. I took the opportunity to convert from Outlook Express to Outlook 2003 for my email – in itself a bit of a saga because backed-up Outlook Express (OE) folders cannot be imported direct into Outlook 2003. Instead you have to set up OE and import backed up folders into that. Then you have to install Outlook 2003 and import mail and address books from the OE system. It works well but is unnecessarily complicated.

Re-installing my user data took a time but was mainly straightforward, the only complication being that the data was still hidden and had to be unhidden yet again after re-installing it.

Next, as my confidence in the machine slowly grew, I began to download and reinstall the "fun" things such as Ham Radio Deluxe and Plane Plotter. I also took the opportunity to rebuild the domestic wireless network using a new router. The previous network used a rather ancient D-Link ADSL Wireless router and had needed frequent re-setting - often several times a day. As I write this, the new router (a BT Home Hub) as been running continuously for six weeks with no problems at a speed of 8.1 Mbit/s – slightly faster than the previous device which could only manage 7.6 Mbit/s. I had read in Radcom that radio amateurs often experience EMC problems with the BT Home Hub and/or its switched mode power supply – but the one I had seemed fine.

Computing at the 'WZK QTH is now back to normal, with all data restored. I learned a great deal from this episode but don't want to go through such a protracted rebuild again on a machine that is so old. I have no idea how for much longer XP downloads will be available, so a new PC is needed. Part Two of this article will therefore describe how I went about designing and building a brand new PC.
